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


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Afonso Reis Cabral

He went twice to Germany in search of a story, the first time at the age of thirteen. He worked in a cowshed, in a tourism office and in a bookstore.

In 2014, he won the LeYa Prize for his novel *O Meu Irmão*, which is in translation in Spain and Italy and has already been published in Brazil. He has contributed dozens of texts to the most varied publications. In 2017, he was awarded the David Mourão-Ferreira European Prize in the category of Promise. He currently works as a freelance editor. In his spare time, he dedicates himself to ornithology, scuba diving and boxing.

omás Laguna could very well be a retired insurance broker who has come to Nidocuervo to enjoy his retirement in peace and quiet in the company of his dog Roco. And Marta Ferrer could pass for a translator who has found in the village the ideal place to live in peace with her son Abel. But the truth is that both are insomniac executioners who have arrived in this corner of the world with borrowed names, pretending that they are not who they have been until recently. However, the balance between reality and fiction that each has chosen for themselves is so fragile that events as fortuitous as a storm or the choice of a photo for the front page of a newspaper will resurrect the ghosts of the past, bringing back into their lives a violence they had hoped to have left behind forever.

a lectura salvaje is not a book about how reading makes us better, about how literature transports us to other worlds, about how fiction allows us to live imaginary lives and can transform reality. Rather, it is a book about the extent to which these commonplaces about reading literature are true.

Literary studies has traditionally made it seem as if reading is a simple decoding operation: "novel X means Y, and only ignorant, uneducated or distracted readers can fail to notice it".

Not so: what goes on in the heads of real readers, readers in the wild, is a mysterious operation that is difficult to generalise.

Cognitive science, neuroscience and empirical reception studies have made important discoveries in the last 25 years concerning reading (and have sometimes ended up rediscovering truths that obscure professors and librarians knew long before, and ignored for decades). If we wanted to sum it up in one sentence, we could say that this book answers the following question: what is really known today, empirically, about the effects of literature?

La lectura salvaje is composed of short chapters, close to the form of a diary, rarely longer than three or four pages. Many of these chapters refer to ideas, experiments and balances that will be collected in a discreet final bibliography. The author manages to keep the tone humorous, filling the book with jokes and everyday anecdotes.



he voice of Teresa of Ávila reimagined from freedom and radicalism: a bold novel about a woman who broke the mould.

It's 1562 and Teresa of Ávila, at the age of forty-seven, is housed in the palace of Luisa de la Cerda in Toledo. But... what if Teresa - a Carmelite nun, writer and woman - had written another manuscript in parallel, a more intimate diary, not intended to please or defend her before anyone, but to evoke her past life and try to explain herself as a human being? That is what Cristina Morales imagines, giving voice to a different Teresa, free from ties and commitments.

His next novel, Kanada (2017), won the City of Santander Prize and the Cálamo Otra Mirada Prize, and was first runner-up for the Tigre Juan International Prize. He then published Ni siquiera los muertos (2020), finalist for the prize for the best book of the year awarded by the Gremio de Libreros de Madrid. The monumental Lo demás es aire (2023), winner of the Ciutat de Barcelona Prize for Literature and the Vanity Fair Prize for best novel, established him as one of the most important authors in Spanish literature. His latest book is Mapa de soledades (2024), a literary essay in which he traces an X-ray of solitude in different places and times, mixing history, literature and memory. He currently lives in Madrid, where he teaches literary workshops.

ne can be alone for many reasons. There are forced loners and loners by choice; there are passing and eternal solitudes; solitudes that lead to madness and others that lead to pleasure and creation. or ten years Dora has ritualistically mourned her husband's death, a pointless ritual that forced her to rely on support from old friends and acquaintances. Left Behind in Lisbon

Empty Wardrobes is an appropriate if brutally reductive title for this unsparing depiction of the lives of women in mid-twentieth-century Lisbon, executed Portuguese writer Maria Judite de Carvalho (1921–1998) as precisely and without sentiment as an autopsy. Originally published in 1966, it is the first work by Carvalho to appear in English, in what seems an excellent translation by Margaret Jull Costa. Deftly and cunningly written, narrated by an observer who glides in and out of the text with the patrician disdain of a Nabokov character, Empty Wardrobes is gradually revealed to be a double portrait: at its core are two middle-aged Portuguese women—two "empty wardrobes"—ironically linked by their relationship to a preening cad who treats both of them badly and walks away blithely untouched by either.

Though in her impassioned introduction Kate Zambreno describes *Empty Wardrobes* as "a hilarious and devastating novel of a traditional Catholic widow's consciousness," there is not much that is even mildly amusing in Carvalho's steely, unadorned prose; certainly there is little Catholic consciousness in the incurious Dora Rosário and virtually nothing of the familiar domestic impedimenta of Catholicism. Dora doesn't observe the

sacraments, even confession and communion; we never see her attending mass; if she is concerned with the condition of her soul, we are not made aware of it; her "religion" is the observation of unvarying routine performed with "eyes...as dull as an empty house or unnaturally bright when she became excited."

Zambreno also describes the novel, for all its domestic interiority and apparent indifference to history, as a "deeply political" work of fiction reflecting "the ambient cruelty of patriarchy, an oppression even more severe in the God, Fatherland, and Family authoritarianism of the Salazar regime [1932-1968] in Portugal." Indeed, a stifling sort of ether wafts from the cramped interiors of Empty Wardrobes: Dora is first the manager of an antiques shop with few customers, then a saleswoman in a cheap furniture store selling "basic pinewood furniture, mattresses, sofas." Yet it's difficult to see how her congenital dullness can be attributed to the reign of a patriarchal dictator, for surely an adult so lacking in autonomy is a special case; her daughter, who is determined to live a very different sort of life, tells her, "You married a man who was poor and lazy.... I'm going to marry a rich, energetic man who loves me."

n 1916, in the middle of the First World War, two ships arrived in Cadiz with more than six hundred Germans from Cameroon. They had handed themselves in at the Guinean border to the colonial authorities because Spain was a neutral country. They settled, among other places, in Zaragoza, where they formed a small community that would not return to Germany. Among them was the great-grandfather of Eva and Fede, who, almost a century later, can be found at the German cemetery in Zaragoza at the burial of Gabi, their elder brother. Together with their father, they are the last survivors of the Schuster family, a family that went on to form an important food business. But in this day and age, the past can always come back to raise hackles.

With an intrigue that grows page by page, The Germans deals with one of the most shameful and least publicised episodes in Spanish history: how Nazi refugees here in a golden retreat triggered neo-Nazism in Germany. It subtly illuminates the hell that the family can sometimes be, and leaves two uncomfortable questions in the air: When do the faults of the parents expire, and do the children have an obligation to redeem them?



Human skin is the largest organ in the body and is also our presentation to the world. The skin shows the race, age, experience and even character of each one. The skin isolates us and at the same time communicates us with others.

Many well-known names have had their life conditioned by their bad skin – Stalin and the narco Escobar, the writers Updike and Nabokov, the singer Cindy Lauper and some Scorsese's characters appear in these pages – and their adventures, together with those of the narrator, tell us about image and cosmetics, about our hypermedicalized society, and about racism or classism. In short, about a very human experience: the fear of being seen for what we really are.
